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**UPDATE: Philip Mangano, Executive Director of
U.S. Interagency Council on Homelessness, to speak at
Project Homeless Connect**

MANCHESTER (*December 5, 2008*) – Philip Mangano, Executive Director of U.S. Interagency Council on Homelessness; announced on Friday that he will be in attendance and speak at Project Homeless Connect event on Tuesday. In 2007, Mangano was nominated as one of *Time Magazine's 100 Most Influential People*; and in 2006, he was named by *Governing Magazine* as the first Federal official ever to be honored with its *Public Official of the Year Award*. Mangano has been recognized by mainstream and business media for his leadership and results in regards to the issue of homelessness in America.

“Phil Mangano has been one of the most active and effective people to be involved in ending homelessness in America,” Mayor Guinta said. “I am excited to have him speaking at Project Homeless Connect.”

MANCHESTER (*December 4, 2008*) – Heritage United Way, the City of Manchester, the Manchester Continuum of Care, the Greater Manchester Chamber of Commerce and St. Joseph’s Cathedral will be hosting **Project Homeless Connect**; which will be held from **9:30 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. on Tuesday, December 9, 2008, at St. Joseph’s Cathedral; 145 Lowell St.; Manchester.** The event will begin with a ceremony to kick-off the event.

Individuals who are homeless – or at risk of becoming homeless – are encouraged to attend. Project Homeless Connect provides those in need in Manchester with “one-stop” access to services and benefits available to them. These services include: medical/health care screenings and referrals; employment services and opportunities; shelter and housing resources; mental health treatment; substance abuse treatment; domestic violence counseling; and meals, as well as resources for other individually identified needs.

Mayor Frank Guinta said that this event is one of the important benchmarks that was established in the report released in February, “A Home for Everyone: A 10-Year Plan to End Homelessness in the City of Manchester,” as well as from the Mayor’s Steering Committee to End Homelessness.

“Back in February, I made a call to action regarding the moral issue of ending homelessness in the city. Project Homeless Connect is a step in that direction,” Guinta said. “While homelessness is unacceptable in our city, the way to solve this most important issue is through cooperation, compassion and creative thinking.”

Susan Howland, Coordinator of Homelessness Services for the City of Manchester and Heritage United Way praises “the generosity of numerous sponsors and supporters allows Project Homeless Connect to provide these services.
