Mayor Theodore Gatsas' inauguration on January 5, 2010 was the beginning of a new administration in the City of Manchester. Along with the Mayor, also comes new staff for the Mayor's Office. This staff includes a Chief of Staff, Special Assistant to the Mayor, and a Constituent Services Representative. While these positions may seem self-explanatory, I wanted to talk to Vicki Ferraro, the Constituent Service Representative for the Mayor's Office about her job and her new role working for the City of Manchester.

### Spotlight on Staff: Shannon Hebert



Shannon has served at OYS for 6 years implementing the WYR Project as a Youth Services Counselor. She teaches in the PRIME for Life program. Outside of her work at OYS she coaches field hockey at Southside Middle School.

Ms. Ferraro described her position by explaining its two main functions. One of them is to help the citizens of Manchester with issues they are dealing with or ideas they have for improving the community. These requests are all very different. They come in as emails, letters, phone calls, or in person. Ms. Ferraro has to prioritize the requests and works with the other staff members to respond to everyone or point them in the right direction. The second part of her position is to represent the mayor at events or meetings that he is unable to attend. In this role, she brings back the important ideas and issues that were addressed to discuss with the mayor.

Ms. Ferraro became interested in public service during high school. She became a volunteer at the Red Cross, the Manchester Animal Shelter, and AARP. "I enjoy helping people and making a positive impact on the community," said Ms. Ferraro. She told me more about what inspired her to work in government. As she was volunteering at AARP, she attended some presidential debates. Her interest in government grew. She knew people who were involved in government and decided to volunteer on the mayoral campaign.

### OYS Honored by the YMCA



OYS was appreciated by the Greater Manchester Family [YMCA](http://YMCA) for collaborative work to keep youth in school.

The Constituent Services Representative is the first government position she has held. "Working for the mayor is very exciting. Every day is different; I have met many people," she commented. Along with the excitement, she had also faced some challenges. Being new to the job, she has had to learn many things. When asked what advice she has for a young person who is interested in a career in government she quickly responded to get involved in the community. "Get out there. Volunteering will help you meet new people and find interests," she advised. Taking a political science class was another of her suggestions.

Even with her busy schedule, Ms. Ferraro made the time to allow a young person to interview her, showing her interest to help the community. With the excellent staff the Mayor has, it is right to say that Manchester is off to a fantastic start in 2010.
